The ensemble consists of Tamsen Beseke and Robert Miskey, violins; Louise Brown, viola; Stephen Green, cello; and Ruth Kasckow, flute.

Their program includes Telemann's "Canonic Sonata No. 1 for Flute and Violin" and two Beethoven selections: "Serenade in D Major" and "String Quartet

A major."

Beseke has performed and toured with orchestras around the world. She teachs privately and has taught at California State Universities at Fullerton and Los Angeles and Westmont College.

Canadian Miskey recently appeared with the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the Musique et Amitie festival in Switzerland and the Banff Festival.

Brown has performed with the San Francisco Opera,

Western Opera Theater and Dayton and Columbus (Ohio) symphonies. She teaches violin and viola privately.

Green has played with orchestras in his native Canada and Southern California. He teaches cello privately and coaches the Los Angeles Youth Orchestra and Verdugo Young Musicians Association.

Flutist Kasckow teaches and performs in orchestras, chamber music ensembles and solo recitals. She has authored "The Flute Duet Practice Books" and has recorded two solo CDs.


#### **Ragtime Concert**

Now it is a living museum, providing a glimpse into the lives of a pioneering family who made their fortune in the citrus industry. The House is open to the public for docent-led tours from 2-4 p.m. the second Sunday of each month.

#### House gets a botanical addition

House maintenance director John Walcek donated a large pencil cactus, commonly known as milkbush, which he planted at the southeast corner of the House this month.

It's not a true cactus, but a member of the Euphorbia family, a leafless tree that sprouts tiny leaves at the ends of new branches. It's droughtresistant, as well as a rodent deterrent. It's milky sap is toxic to the touch.

It can grow as high as 30 feet when grown outside.
